APPLICATION UNDER THE FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT 1991

I refer to your application made under the *Freedom of Information Act 1991* (Act), dated 21 May 2020.

Your application seeks access to:

"Copies of any and all documents (including but not limited to hard copy or electronic: briefing notes, minutes, reports, emails, letters, meeting agendas, diary entries, event attendance records and any other correspondence) either to or from (directly or indirectly) the Treasurer and/or Treasurer staff that mention or reference in any way Tauondi College, from 18 March 2018 to 21 May 2020."

The purpose of this letter is to advise you of my determination. An extensive search was conducted within this office. A total of 6 documents were identified as answering the terms of your application.

I grant you access in full to 1 document; a copy of which is enclosed. I grant you access in part to 2 documents, copies of which are enclosed. I refuse you access to 3 documents.

Released in Full

Document 1

Released in Part

Document 3 is a table attachment detailing government funding provided to organisations, with out of scope information redacted.

Document 4 is table attachment detailing the delivery of government services to Narungga people, with out of scope information removed.

Documents Refused in Full

Document 2 is a report titled '2018 The State of the Sector'. This report was tabled in Parliament on 14 November 2018, and as it is publically available has not been provided to you.

Document 5 is a draft of an attachment for a Cabinet submission and was provided to myself for use in Cabinet or a Cabinet Committee meeting. If released, this would disclose materials prepared for the use of a Minister in relation to a matter intended to be submitted to the highest level of Government decision-making, Cabinet. This is indicative of its important and sensitive nature. Cabinet requires absolute candour and frankness in the confidential information it receives in order to properly consider, deliberate and make a decision about the best option for Government. I determine this information exempt pursuant to clause 1(1)(f) to the Act.

Document 6 is a Parliamentary Estimates Briefing Note which was prepared specifically for use in Parliament, the disclosure of which would infringe the privilege of Parliament. I have therefore determined exempt this document in full pursuant to clause 17(c) of Schedule 1 to the Act.

Exemptions

Clause 1 - Cabinet Documents

- (1) A document is an exempt document—
 - (a) if it is a document that has been specifically prepared for submission to Cabinet (whether or not it has been so submitted); or
 - (b) if it is a preliminary draft of a document referred to in paragraph (a); or
 - (c) if it is a document that is a copy of or part of, or contains an extract from, a document referred to in paragraph (a) or (b).

17—Documents subject to contempt etc

A document is an exempt document if it contains matter the public disclosure of which would, but for any immunity of the Crown—

- (a) constitute contempt of court; or
- (b) contravene any order or direction of a person or body having power to receive evidence on oath; or
- (c) infringe the privilege of Parliament.

Please note, in compliance with Premier and Cabinet Circular PC045 - Disclosure Logs for Non-Personal Information Released through Freedom of Information (PC045), the Department of Treasury and Finance is now required to publish a log of all non-personal information released under the Act.

In accordance with this Circular, any non-personal information determined for release as part of this application, may be published on the DTF website. A copy of PC045 can be found at the following address: https://dpc.sa.gov.au/resources-and-publications/premier-and-cabinet-circulars. Please visit the website for further information.

As I am determining this application as Principal Officer, Section 29(6) of the Act does not provide for an internal review. If you are dissatisfied with my determination you are entitled to exercise your rights of external review with the Ombudsman.

Alternatively, you can apply to the South Australian Civil and Administrative Tribunal. If you wish to seek a review, Section 39(3) of the Act states you must do so within 30 calendar days of receiving the determination.


South Australian Minister for Innovation and Skills Hon David Pisoni MP recently launched the <u>the University of Adelaide's ThincLab</u>
