# September quarter 2023

#### **SUMMARY**

### During the year to September 2023, South Australia's Estimated Resident Population (ERP) increased 1.7% (or 30,700 persons) to 1,860,054 people.


 Nationally, the ERP increased 2.5% to 26,821,557 people.

#### **FURTHER ANALYSIS**

South Australia's population rose by 0.4% during the September quarter 2023, to be 1.7% higher than a year ago. Nationally, population rose by 0.6% in the September quarter 2023 and was 2.5% higher than a year earlier—see Chart 1.

Population growth over the year by jurisdiction, from highest to lowest was: Western Australia (3.3%), Victoria (2.9%), Queensland (2.7%), New South Wales (2.3%), the ACT (2.1%), South Australia (1.7%), the Northern Territory (0.7%) and Tasmania (0.3%).

In the September quarter 2023, contributions to South Australia's population growth of 7,800 came from net overseas migration (7,400) and natural increase (700), partly offset by net interstate migration (-300).

In the 12 months to September 2023 the largest contribution to South Australia's population growth came from net overseas migration, which totalled 28,600 persons, up 30% from the previous 12 months. Natural increase over the period totalled 3,200, down 15% from the previous 12 months. In the year to September 2023, there was a <u>net</u> interstate outflow of 1,000 people from South Australia, a turnaround from the gain of 1,500 in the previous 12 months—see Chart 2.
